Greetings Mayor and Council,

Obviously another challenging weekend on the storm front. We've received about 23 inches of rain thus far in August; our historic average is about 6 inches for the month.

While all this rain is clearly exposing major flaws in our infrastructure, it should not overshadow the tremendous work and hustle shown by our Water and Sewer staff. They've been burning some serious midnight oil lately, and their actions late into the evening – taking control of multiple lift stations, making major adjustments at the treatment plant, vacuuming spills, sandbagging, removing blockages – have made a huge difference on the ground. Things could have been much worse without their decisive action.

Just today I got the following email from a resident:

Good Afternoon Bret,

I'm sure that you had a hectic weekend coping with the problems caused by the deluge, but it gave a few of your employees a chance to shine. My daughter and several other couples were at our house on the south end, and they started having plumbing problems. After all the troubleshooting that could be done inside the house, they called us, and my wife called the city. She ultimately ended up talking to Joel at the water department, and he was helpful beyond any expectation. This is especially noteworthy because I'm sure they were having problems sorting out the basic issues and keeping the system going. I hope things can get back to normal soon, but I didn't want this opportunity to pat Joel on the back to go by unnoticed.

I spent a morning two weeks ago with our Water and Sewer staff, thanking them for their work and listening to their concerns and needs. This is a group that is proud of what they do, and truly care about the community they serve. If you see them in the field, please take a moment to give them a shout out for all they do for Tybee Island.

Draft Quality of Life Ordinance Revisions

Sgt. Hattrich and I have been working with the City Attorney's Office on a group of proposed ordinance changes intended to make it more straight-forward to address certain quality of life matters on Tybee, such as derelict vehicles, blighted properties, and animal control.

Attached please find the following draft ordinance changes:

- **Right of Way Parking Ordinance**, which limits the amount of continuous time someone can park their car on a public ROW to 48 hours, unless the space is immediately adjacent to your property. Currently vehicles can be left in the same space for seven straight days before it must be moved. This standard has proven difficult to enforce.
- **Property Maintenance Ordinance**. The proposed changes provide more precise and detailed definitions to clarify enforcement, and reduce the amount of time objects can be placed on private property from 30 consecutive days to 10 days.
- **Nuisance Declared Ordinance**. The proposed changes provide more precise definitions for enforcement, and expand coverage to include structures and fences for safety.
- **Protection of Animals in Hot Cars Ordinance**. The proposed changes clarify the City's enforcement authority and the conditions for action if officials encounter an animal in a hot car. They provide measurable temperature standards for intervention, and reduce the City's liability should vehicle damage occur during rescue efforts.
- **Nuisance Animal Noise Ordinance**. The proposed changes expand the animals covered from primarily dogs to include fowl, and reduces the nuisance definition from 30 consecutive minutes of noise to 10 consecutive minutes.

Please let Sgt. Hattrich or I know of any comments or suggested changes. We plan to place these ordinances on upcoming City Council Agendas as they are ready.

Hiring of new HR Director

I am pleased to report that we have successfully negotiated the hiring of our next HR Director, contingent on successful passage of background check and drug screen, and confirmation by City Council.

Rachel Combs is scheduled to begin work on Tybee Island on Sept. 29. She has been the Human Resources Director for the City of Sharonville, Ohio, since 2022. Previously she served as:

- Human Resources Manager for the City of Middletown, Ohio
- Human Resources Coordinator for the City of Westerville, Ohio
- Human Resources Analyst for Chatham County, Ga., Government
- Human Resources Specialist for the City of Middletown, Ohio

Our hiring process included a group interview involving most department heads. Ms. Combs impressed City leadership with her thoughtful approach to human resources, calm demeanor, and significant experience with municipal government.

I look forward to introducing Ms. Combs to City Council.

Civic Rec Reservation Website Notes:

Since the implementation of the reservation site, staff have established a more efficient, paperless policy that eliminates the need for refundable damage and cleaning deposits. At the start of FY2025, the facility deposit account reflected a balance of \$9,350, consisting of deposits from reservations made prior to July 1, 2024, as well as deposits retained on file by recurring users. Beginning in February, staff initiated steps to close the account. This week, the final journal entry and two refund requests totaling \$150 were submitted to Finance, fully clearing the balance.

Upcoming Special Events:

The **Labor Day Beach Bash** will launch the City's fall special event season next weekend. Preparations for upcoming events are ongoing, with recent progress including:

- Development of promotional and design materials for distribution.
- Coordination with Chatham Emergency Services to secure additional ambulance standby coverage for larger annual events.
- Completion of the fireworks exhibition permit process, including Fire Chief approval and submission to the Safety Fire Commissioner, in advance of the Beach Bash.
- Receipt of required insurance documentation for the fall Carnival at Hotel Tybee.
- Finalization of the 2025 Pirate Fest site plan, which includes approval for a 30-foot pirate ship display at the roundabout. Staff appreciates the cooperation of TIFD and TIPD in accommodating this addition, which is expected to enhance the festival atmosphere and support nearby businesses.

Following Labor Day weekend, staff will continue working to complete the remaining special event permit requirements.

Film Permits:

Staff is currently reviewing a Commercial Film Production Application for a movie titled *Spy Beach*. The applicant LLC is a newly formed production company with limited experience, and staff is monitoring their ability to meet permit requirements. To date, the applicant has submitted some requested information for review; however, several requirements remain outstanding. Proposed production dates are scheduled for October.

Historic Preservation Commission (HPC)

CLG Grant – Local Historic District Project

The Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) held a Public Workshop on August 19 with strong community participation. A total of 53 attendees signed in, and 68 were counted in the audience at peak attendance. HPC members and staff worked extensively to prepare for the event, which featured a presentation by HPC Chair Holly Grell-Lawe, open discussion, small group activities, and voting opportunities. This format allowed participants multiple ways to provide input on the proposed local historic district as the HPC continues efforts to preserve the historic built environment on Tybee's north end. The high level of engagement reflected strong community interest in learning more, asking questions, and sharing feedback.

Trolley Tour / Tour of Homes

The HPC Education and Promotion Committee has begun planning for the next Trolley Tour/Tour of Homes. The inaugural event earlier this year was well-received, and the committee looks forward to incorporating attendee feedback to strengthen the 2026 program. The goal is to provide an engaging and educational experience that highlights Tybee's historic character and promotes appreciation of its unique built environment.

Main Street Program

Shop Local Receipt Program:

The third week of the Tybee Island receipt program has been a great success! As of Friday morning, we have received 66 submissions. This program is designed to encourage local shopping and support Tybee Island businesses while giving back to the customers who make it all possible. The total dollars reported from receipts in the third week are \$2,799.58

Streetscape Improvements:

- **Bike Racks:** Main Street is working with the Department of Public Works to install new bike racks on the South End, with the goal of having them in place by Labor Day.
- **Mobile Visitor Center:** The project continues to move forward as we work to bring visitor resources directly to the community and key island events. The Department of Public Works is also providing support by contributing ideas for building out the back of the vehicle for storage and updating the interior to better serve our needs. We are very excited to show the vehicle off at its first official appearance on Tuesday, September 16, from 10–11:30 a.m. at River's End Campground, where we will host the Carolinas Association of Campgrounds Fall Tour

Holiday Events: The Main Street Promotion Committee and Board have finalized the schedule for the upcoming Tybee for the Holidays events. The schedule is as follows:

- Small Business Saturday: November 29
- Christmas Tree Lighting: December 1 at 6 p.m.
- Annual Christmas Parade: December 12 at 6:30 p.m.
- Holiday Market: December 13 from 11 a.m. – 8 p.m. and December 14 from noon – 4 p.m.

Committees are actively planning the details for each event to enhance this year's holiday festivities and expand Tybee for the Holidays into a full weekend of programming for both residents and visitors. These events traditionally draw strong community participation and also generate increased economic activity for local businesses during the holiday season. Additional information and promotional materials will be distributed as the events approach.

Sand Cat Ribbon Cutting: Maggie met with representatives from the Savannah Area Chamber of Commerce, Visit Tybee, and Sand Cat Coffee to plan the upcoming ribbon-cutting event. This will be the first ribbon-cutting where Main Street has partnered with the Chamber, and we are very excited about the collaboration.

The ribbon cutting will take place on **Friday, September 5, at 10 a.m.** The ribbon will be cut at 10:15 a.m., followed by a tasting and a few complimentary goodies provided by Sand Cat Coffee. This event will serve as a great community gathering for both residents and visitors, while also highlighting a new business on Tybee. We look forward to the

celebration and to continuing to strengthen our relationship with the Chamber through future partnerships.

Analysis

- **EMS and Medical Assists:** The majority of calls (16 out of 21) were related to EMS or medical assists, reflecting the department's critical role in supporting medical emergencies on the island. These incidents were distributed across various locations, with no single area showing a significant concentration.
- **Alarm System Issues:** Two incidents involved alarm system malfunctions or unintentional activations (15 Tybrisa Apt F and 916 Miller Avenue). Both were resolved without escalation.
- **Assist Invalid:** Two calls at 604 15th Street involved assisting an invalid, indicating a potential recurring need at this address.
- **No Incident Found:** One call (1600 Tybrisa) resulted in no incident found upon arrival, suggesting a possible false report or resolved issue prior to response.
- **Public Service Assistance:** One call (1801 Butler) involved general public service assistance, demonstrating the department's broader community support role.
- **In Progress:** One EMS call (19 Tybrisa, F25080737) remains in progress, and the department is coordinating with relevant parties to resolve it.

Lifeguard Operations

Due to many lifeguards returning to school, the department is currently operating with a skeleton crew for beach safety operations. Despite the reduced staffing, the lifeguard team performed admirably this week, managing challenging conditions caused by rough seas from Hurricane Elin. Their efforts ensured no major emergencies occurred, and they successfully kept beachgoers safe under difficult circumstances.

Operational Notes

- All closed incidents were handled efficiently, with response times within acceptable limits.
- The department continues to maintain full operational readiness for fire and EMS responses, with no equipment or staffing issues reported during this period.
- The recurring calls at 604 15th Street (assist invalid) may warrant further investigation to determine if additional community support services are needed.
- The in-progress EMS call at 19 Tybrisa is under active management, and an update will be provided in the next report if it remains unresolved.

Recommendations

1. **Community Outreach:** Consider a follow-up visit or coordination with social services for the resident at 604 15th Street to address recurring invalid assistance calls.
2. **Alarm System Inspections:** Engage property managers at 15 Tybrisa Apt F and 916 Miller Avenue to ensure alarm systems are maintained to prevent future false activations.
3. **EMS Training:** Continue to prioritize EMS training for personnel, given the high volume of EMS-related calls.
4. **Lifeguard Staffing:** Explore options to bolster lifeguard staffing, such as temporary hires or extended shifts, to support the team during the school season and ensure continued beach safety.

- Cleaned up litter and loose recycling from off the main yard.

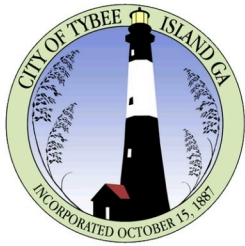
Fleet Services
