Greetings Mayor and Council,

It appears that we have dodged another couple of spinning storms this week. But our brush with Tropical Storm Imelda, in addition to the very powerful Hurricane Humberto farther to the east, are a good reminder that we remain in the middle of hurricane season.

With two cyclones charging off-shore, we will likely experience rough seas this week, potential rip currents and further erosion to our beach.

Getting Rid of Old Vehicles



We're finally making progress on moving the City's surplus vehicles and boats off the island. Many vehicles and watercraft have been sitting inoperable for years, taking up space in the Public Safety Building parking lot, Fire Station bays, and public parking spaces. The vehicles haven't been moving on the GovDeals online site that we use, so this summer we reached out to a few area auction houses, and ended up engaging Low Country Auctions.

Low Country Auctions this month listed seven of our surplus vehicles and two surplus boats on its auction site. The bidding period ends Oct. 1. If nobody bids by then, Low Country Auctions will haul the equipment away.

We now have a centralized process in place designed to ensure timely disposal of surplus City vehicles. No more Tybee junk yards.

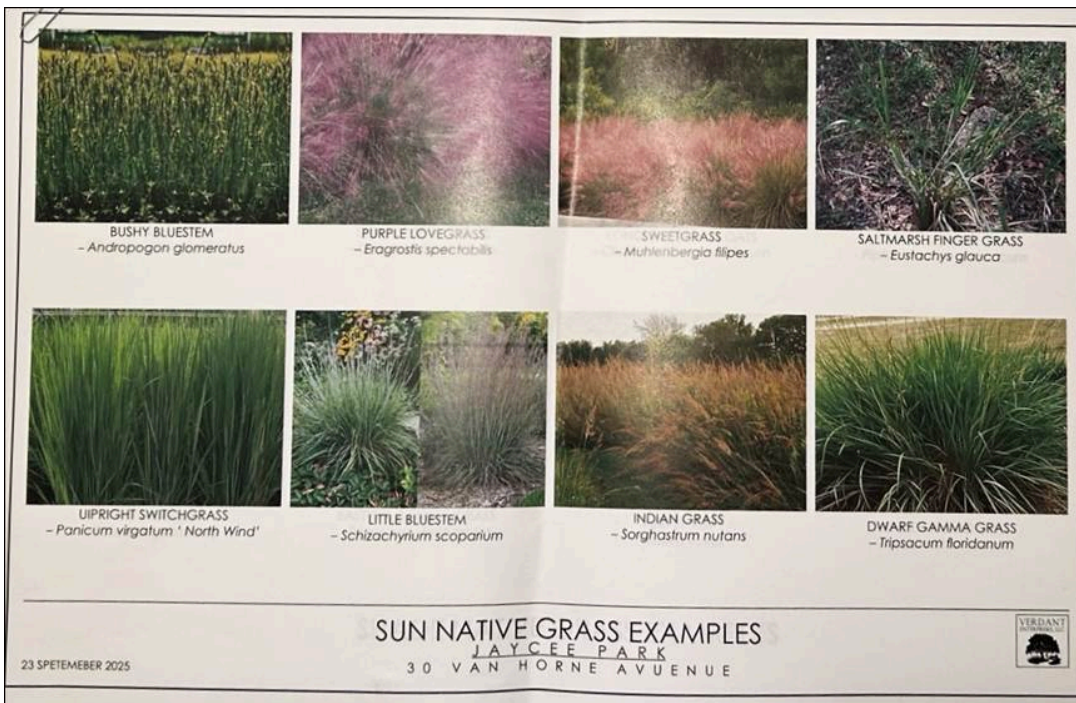
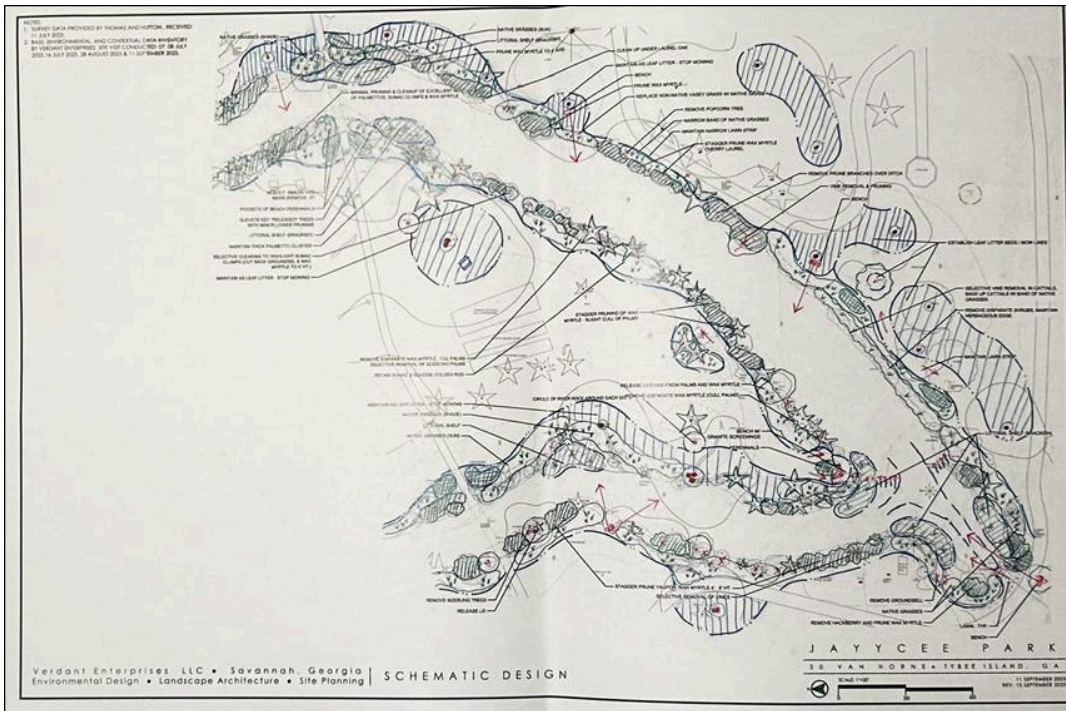
Jaycee Park Lagoon to Get Makeover

We met last week with our landscape design consultant Verdant Enterprises, who is working with us on stormwater and landscaping enhancements along the canal at Jaycee Park.

The team at Verdant has surveyed existing conditions along the canal, including an inventory of all trees, shrubs and grass on the banks. They have developed a schematic plan that would deepen the canal by 2 feet on average, create several

littoral shelves in the canal, remove or thin undesirable non-native trees, open view corridors, and replace turf and address bare spots with low-maintenance native grasses such as sweetgrass and switchgrass. The goal is to restore the entire lagoon system to ecological and visual health.

We have been working with the DNR throughout the design process, and are now ready to go out to bid, with work expected to commence late this fall. The work will be funded in part through a \$100,000 grant we won from Amazon earlier this year.



Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) Work Begins

Staff met last week with the contractor to plan for placement of new cell equipment to support our planned AMI system. AMI stands for Advanced Metering Infrastructure. With AMI, every City of Tybee Water System customer will be able to accurately measure water usage in their home or business.

This will be accomplished by the AMI unit automatically sending a secure, digital message to a data collection cell tower using a cellular signal. The cell tower then transmits all meter reads to the City of Tybee through a specialized software, where the information is processed within the City's utility billing system.

The system will allow staff to read all water meters across the island from Water and Sewer offices, instead of requiring workers to drive by every property on the island to pick up meter readings. This will save time and improve operational efficiency, but will also allow our customers to monitor their water usage in real time from their homes.

The system requires the placement of new antennae to transit the data. We have identified three locations for the new infrastructure:

- Next to Lift Station #2 at 2nd Avenue and 17th Street
- At the main well at 2nd Street and 2nd Avenue
- On the north end water tower behind the Public Safety Building.

Work will begin in late October.

Grant Opportunity for Infrastructure Improvements

The City Engineer, Water & Sewer Director and I met last week with Judy Adler with the Georgia Environmental Finance Authority to discuss funding opportunities to correct the sanitary sewer inflow and infiltration issues we have experienced on the south end of Tybee.

GEFA just last week announced a one-time Hurricane Helene Resilience Funding opportunity for counties that were declared disaster areas, of which Chatham is one. The fund is designed to improve the resilience of wastewater and drinking water infrastructure in small communities. GEFA would waive the loan principal for projects that qualify by 30-50%. Ms. Adler expressed optimism that some of the projects that we are in the process of identifying to prevent further large rain-induced sewage spills would qualify for the Helene program. We are pulling a project list together in order to apply for the Helene funding by the Dec. 31 deadline.



While we were touring the Wastewater Treatment Plant with the GEFA official, we watched as a City-hired contractor, BRW Construction, used heavy equipment to repair a faulty drain valve on clarifier No. 1. The work required digging more than 10 feet to locate the valve. The work was completed, and the valve is now fully operational. It was a good reminder of the heavy work that occurs every day to operate our utility.

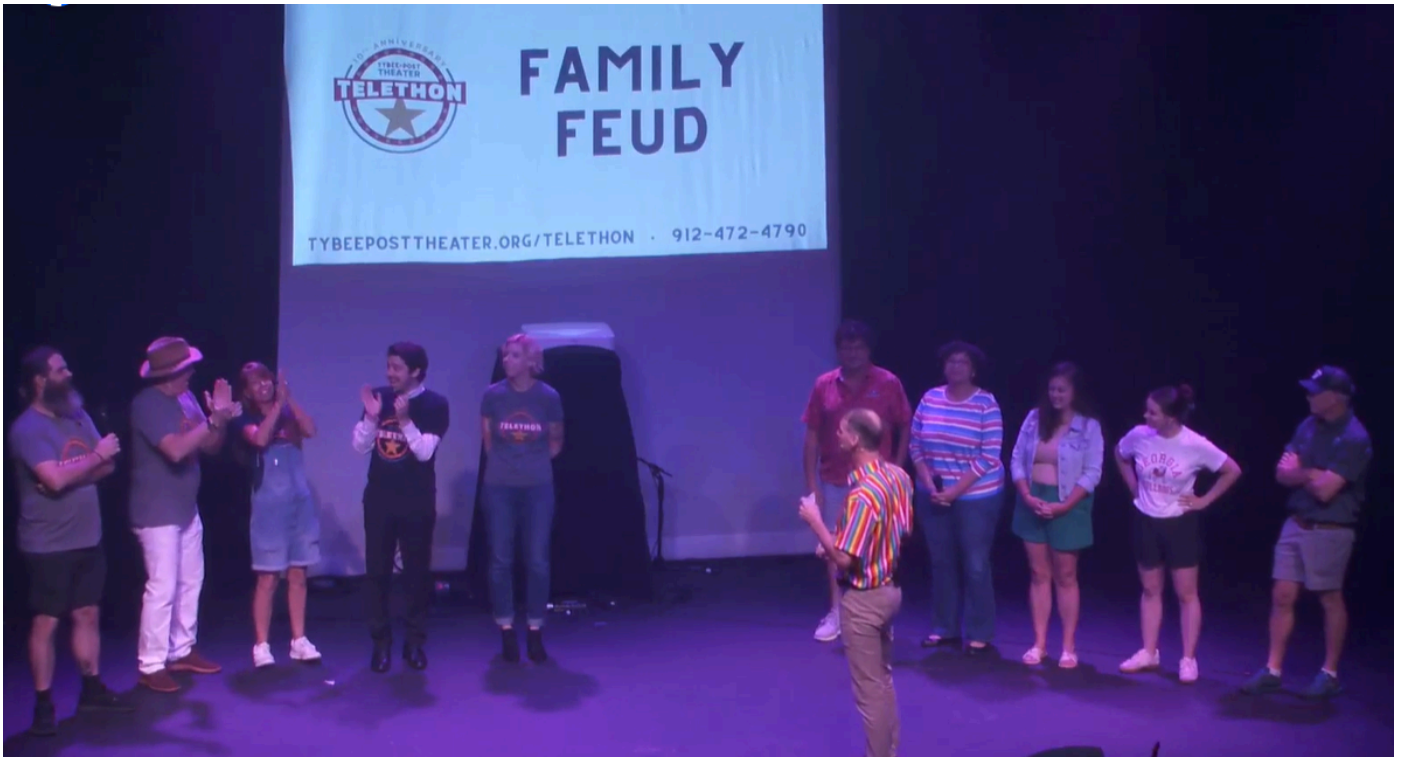


Tybee is the Best

Councilman Park was in his element in the DJ booth.



Communications and Outreach Update

Communications

Capital Infrastructure Improvement Communications Plan

In preparation for several upcoming water and sewer infrastructure projects, staff have developed a proactive communications and outreach strategy. The plan is designed to keep residents and visitors informed about project timelines, expected impacts, and the City's efforts to invest in long-term utility resilience.

South End Lighting & Electrical Upgrades

The South End lighting and electrical improvements are nearly complete, with only final programming tasks remaining. Decorative ring lights have been added to the palm trees along Butler Avenue, and electrical systems on Strand Avenue have been upgraded. The new lights are app-controlled, allowing the City to adjust colors for seasons, holidays, and environmental needs (such as sea turtle nesting season). Light color and temperature can be modified to minimize any potential impact on marine life.

Beach Erosion & Nourishment Communications

Staff are working in partnership with Visit Tybee and consultant Alan Robertson to develop clear, visitor-focused messaging about current beach conditions and upcoming nourishment efforts. This communication will help manage expectations, promote safe recreation, and educate guests about the City's long-term shoreline resilience work.

Maryland Governors' Delegation Visit

Staff participated in planning sessions for the Maryland Governor's Delegation, which will visit Tybee in October. The visit will showcase the City's resilience efforts.

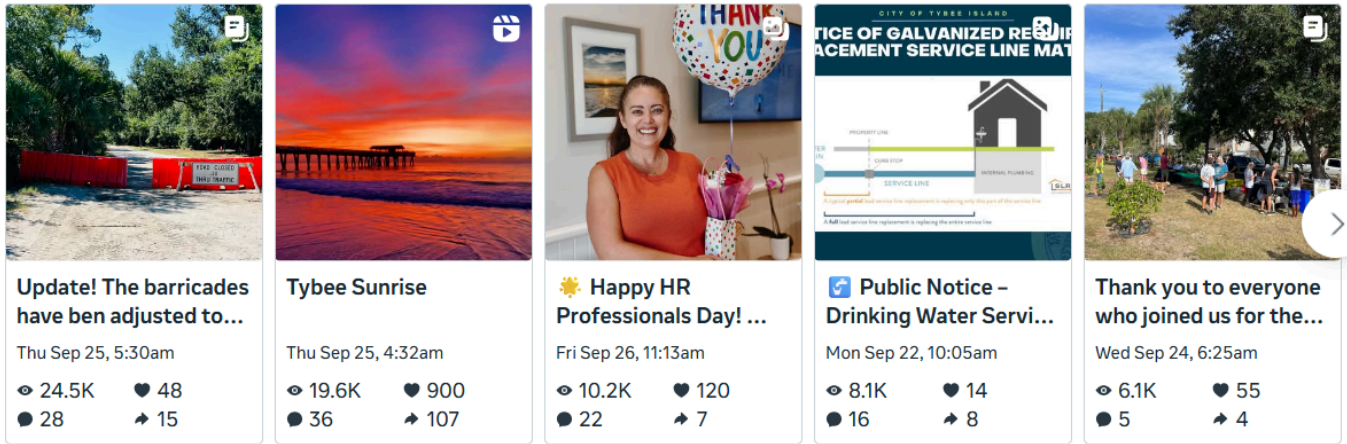

Atomic Bar Ribbon Cutting: Staff coordinated with the owners of the Atomic Bar to plan a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The ceremony will take place on Friday, October 3, 2025, at 11 a.m. at 1515 Butler Avenue. This event will be an opportunity to be among the first to step inside the retro-inspired cocktail lounge. - Replaced manhole housing on Chatham Avenue, and placed cold patch (material used to cover holes that is made of asphalt) on some bad spots at 12th, and Miller Avenue.
- Televised sewer line on 8th Street.
- Live Oak continues with their fiber optic project. We are requiring them to pot hole to reduce damage to water and sewer lines.
- Repaired a sewer lateral on Shipwatch Lane, and cleaned the sewer line while we were in there.
- Cleaned work trucks, and cleaned a sewer line on Chatham Avenue.
- Several GA 811 locates performed, located and looked at water meters for homeowners, and helped a homeowner find a leak under the residence. Homeowner was advised to contact a plumber.
- Several broken meter lids were replaced, antennas, and changed out dead battery registers and raised meter boxes.
- Two of the three water wells now have operating chlorine analyzers to monitor for chlorine leaks. Fort Screven well analyzer is in the process of being installed.

Around the Campground

- 93 Arrivals, 465 Site Nights, 63.87% Occupancy, Up 18% YoY. (Storms in 2024 accounted for lower occupancy this week)
- 10 guests turned away due to lack of accommodations for requested dates. (3 were for Pirates Fest weekend)
- Pruned overgrowth behind cabins.
- Replaced 50 amp outlet on Site 59.
- Replaced damaged door handle on Cabin 108.
- Thawed/cleaned out Ice Merchandiser to remove build up.
