Also great to see City staff getting into the Halloween spirit and showing the island that we are very much part of this community. Cheers to DPW, which took home 1<sup>st</sup> Place in the decoration contest!





## **Draft State Legislative Agenda**

Fall also means the 2026 Legislative Session is right around the corner. As last year, I plan to ask City Council to formally adopt a Tybee Island Legislative Agenda during the Nov. 13 City Council Meeting. Below is a first draft we pulled together with our Legislative Lobbyist, Tom Gehl. Please send me additional draft items for Council discussion, and offer comments on the below.

**Support a Municipal Option Sales Tax (MOST) for Tybee Island:** *Residents of the City of Tybee Island should be given the option to decide whether to pay for future water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure costs solely through rates or also asking the more than one million visitors to share in the costs through the levy of a one-percent municipal option sales tax (MOST) on goods purchased in the city.*

The municipal option sales tax, or "MOST," is an existing law and not a new tax. A MOST is in addition to any other sales tax imposed within the municipality's jurisdiction. Expanding the MOST law to apply to Tybee

Island would give municipal voters the choice to use a 1% sales tax to pay for water, sewer and stormwater cost as opposed to rate increases or general fund subsidies.

The MOST law authorizes cities to call for a referendum on a 1% sales tax on retail sales of tangible personal property to fund water and sewer capital costs/projects. Each MOST is for a four-year term.

**State Support for Infrastructure Projects:** *The Tybee Island legislative delegation deserves appreciation for securing beach renourishment funds in the 2024 legislative session. The Tybee Island City Council asks that the delegation consider additional financial support for resiliency investments across the island.*

Tybee Island taxpayers are facing over \$80 million in anticipated capital infrastructure costs. Recent expenditures on dune restoration by the city will total over \$1 million due to impacts largely from the channel deepening project and the shipping into the Port of Savannah. State support for the long-term infrastructure costs on Tybee Island are critical in maintaining the economic engine fueled by tourism.

**Tybee Road Raising:** *The Tybee Island City Council supports engagement with the legislative delegation and Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) to begin planning for the construction of an elevated or reconfigured U.S. Tybee Island causeway that is more resilient to flood events.*

The Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) is planning to replace the Bull River and Lazaretto Creek bridges in two years. The section of U.S. 80 between the bridges is prone to flooding multiple times each year, completely cutting off Tybee from the mainland and creating a significant threat to public safety. With the ocean rising by an average of half an inch per year on Tybee, federal agencies predict the number of annual coastal flooding events will quadruple over the next two decades. GDOT's planning for construction of a new causeway should begin as soon as possible due to the dramatic increase in flood events and the time it will take to complete construction of this magnitude.

**Support for Limitations on Municipal Liability:** *The Tybee Island City Council supports the efforts by the Georgia Municipal Association to pass legislation that limits municipal liability and limit cities' exposure to costly litigation.*

Municipalities act for the public good and should have reasonable limits on tort liability to protect taxpayers from unnecessary financial burdens.

**Tybee Island Maritime Academy:** *Being the only public school on Tybee Island, and with a curriculum focused on maritime sciences and logistics-related careers in the Savannah Logistics Technology Corridor, the City Council of Tybee Island supports efforts to secure state funding support for a new school facility.*

Estimated expansion costs for a new Tybee Island Maritime Academy (TIMA) facility are over \$20 million. The City, TIMA and the YMCA are exploring a partnership to develop shared-use space in an effort to maximize community resources. While the State Charter Schools Commission will likely pursue the creation of a Senate Study Committee on Charter Schools Funding in 2026 that could result in recommendations to increase state investments in charter school facilities funding, state appropriations to support TIMA's facility should be explored in the FY 2027 State budget.

**Oppose Short-term Rental Preemption Legislation:** *The Tybee Island City Council opposes state-level, one-size-fits-all preemption of local STR ordinances.*

Legislation has been introduced in previous years to preempt or override certain local government short-term rental ordinances, including a provision that would prevent local governments from suspending or prohibiting the continued use of a property as a short-term rental unit except under very specific circumstances. Decisions on the appropriate regulation of short-term rentals differ in communities across the state based on a variety of factors, and the state should not interfere with these local decisions.

**Support for Home Rule and the Georgia Municipal Association’s Legislative Policies:** *The City of Tybee Island asks that members of the legislature respect decisions made at the municipal level, which is the ultimate “home rule” powers of cities. Tybee Island also supports the legislative policies adopted by the membership of the Georgia Municipal Association in June 2025.*

## **New Business License Forms and Review Process**

As I promised earlier this year, Team Tybee has taken a comprehensive look at our business permitting licenses — business, alcohol and entertainment — as well as our internal review and recommendation process.

A small workgroup was established consisting of Finance, Code Compliance, Police, and Community Development to review and update the City license forms. We used surrounding communities as references, but primarily talked through the critical information Tybee needed to reduce the likelihood of problems, including quality of life conflicts.

Previously, our license application forms were extremely basic, and we lacked a comprehensive review process before placing them in front of City Council for approval. The new process includes a multi-departmental review of applications to review calls for service at each alcohol-serving establishment, a land-use review to ensure the business is property zoned for the proposed use, as well as a review of potential noise conflicts between the business and surrounding properties.

The new forms, which can be filled out electronically, are attached. They were sent to existing business license holders on Monday, and will be used as part of the FY26 renewal process at the end of the year.

Special thanks to our Finance Team for taking the lead on these revisions.

## Historic Preservation Commission (HPC)

- **CLG Grant Project:**
  - The project team met this week to discuss next steps. The project continues to make steady progress with consistent communication to ensure deadlines are met.
  - **Outreach:** Staff have built an email list of property owners within the proposed district and are sharing social media posts featuring frequently asked questions from the project's FAQ document to help inform the community.
- Planning is underway for the 2026 Tour of Homes and a Preservation in the Park event in Jaycee Park.

## Main Street Program

**Board Member Nominations:** On Thursday, the City Council approved the slate of 2025 Tybee Island Main Street and Downtown Development Authority Board members. The approved voting members are Jane Hall and Chrissy Campbell, and the approved ex officio members are Anna Burgard and Laura Hughes. The nominations were recommended by the Main Street Board following a public application process and review by the nominating committee.

### Tybee for the Holidays:

- **Tree Lighting Ceremony:** The stage has been reserved, an MC has been booked, and the special event application has been submitted. Two performances have been confirmed.
- **Christmas Parade:** Advertising efforts are underway, the special event application has been submitted, and the entry application has been posted.

- **Holiday Market:** The special event application has been submitted, the stage has been booked, and the vendor application form has received a strong response with 80 submissions. Staff reviewed the submissions and will reach out to vendors soon. Quotes have been gathered for a kids' train, and entertainment is being finalized, with four performers already confirmed. Kids' activities are underway. Coordination is also in progress for the Pet Parade component of the event.
- **Polar Plunge:** Planning is underway, and staff is beginning the t-shirt design process.

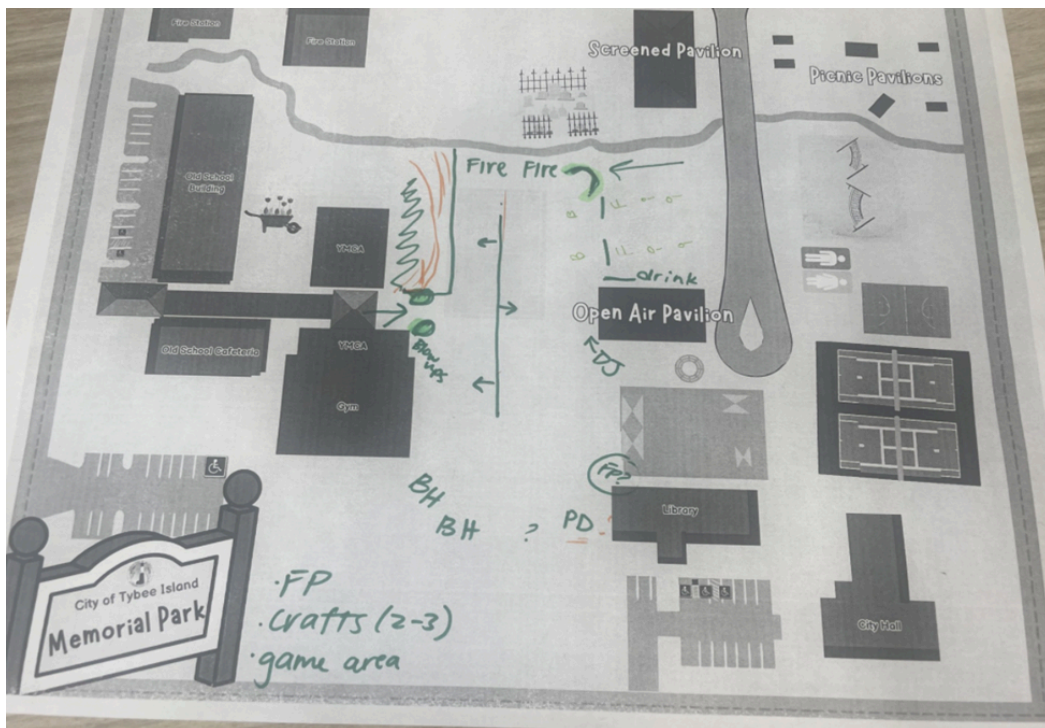

**Trunk-or-Treat Recap:** This year's Trunk-or-Treat at Memorial Park incorporated a revised layout to improve safety and flow. Instead of the traditional outer circle of trunks, all trunks and tables were arranged in two rows down the center of the field, facing north and south. Two clearly marked entrances were used: one with a balloon arch between the pavilions and one at the YMCA/Old School

breezeway with inflatables. An activity ring still surrounded the central setup, featuring bounce houses, face painting, the DJ, and food trucks. TIFD staffed the west end of the field, and TIPD covered the east end to help secure the event area. A short barricade was placed from the YMCA breezeway to the bike path to block access to the drainage area. Two food trucks were positioned near the Open Air Pavilion, which successfully encouraged guests to dine in one location and helped reduce litter. The change to a Saturday schedule with an earlier start time also proved beneficial, supporting higher attendance and allowing more daylight during the event.

After this date, beachgoers are urged to exercise extreme caution, swim at their own risk, and be aware of rip currents and changing tides.
2. **Career Development & Training Initiative:** Lt. Brandon Kaupp, Training Coordinator, distributed department-wide guidance this week on upcoming certification classes for both officers and firefighters. Under Chief McMillian’s **Career Development Plan**, the department is adopting an **aggressive training posture** over the next several years to ensure all personnel meet or exceed progressive milestones.
