Greetings Mayor and Council,

Quite the busy holiday season we've got here on Tybee Island! We've got a recap of holiday events below, but I've heard from a few residents who have told me there is more to do this off-season -- and the island feels more lively -- than previous Decembers. Credit, of course, goes to our busy team of elves -- particularly DPW, Communications and Outreach, and the Main Street crew, as well as our always-working Police and Fire departments making sure we stay safe.

Let's finish the year strong!

Meeting Held with Tybee Arts Association on Future of Black Box Theater

We had a great meeting last week with leadership from the Tybee Arts Association concerning the City-owned Black Box Theater.

As a reminder, our lease agreement with the TAA is expired, so we issued an RFP this fall seeking proposals to manage and program the facility. We received two proposals, including one from the TAA, which prompted a spirited discussion on staff about the future of the facility and the best way to operate it to enhance the arts on Tybee.

The TAA has done a wonderful job for the past few decades staging a range of productions and opportunities for our residents to engage in the arts in this humble facility. Our community truly is better off for it.

But it's also true that the building suffers from significant deferred maintenance that by contract the TAA is responsible for addressing. And the current agreement specifically does not allow some of the programming currently taking place in the facility.

But the RFP process, which resulted in new programming ideas coming from multiple proposals, also highlighted the opportunity for additional classes and camps that could be offered in the facility.

During our meeting last week we informed TAA leadership that the City plans to take over management of the facility, and work with TAA leadership to schedule most of the same productions they currently stage in the building. The City would also work with other organizations to schedule and publicize other cultural opportunities for the public.

Under this structure, the TAA would no longer have to pay for insurance, utilities, an alcohol license or facility maintenance costs.

We are targeting a two-month facility shutdown beginning in August 2026 to address needed repairs and improvements. After the shutdown, the facility would transfer to City of Tybee management.

This proposal was positively received by the Arts Association, and provides a path forward for the nonprofit to continue its great work while opening the possibility of expanded cultural opportunities for Tybee residents in an improved facility.

We will work with the nonprofit over the next six months on the transition.

Advertising Benches Update

Another matter that has been in limbo for most of the fall — the future of Tybee's advertising benches — also took a big step forward last week.

As you will recall, we had a discussion over the summer with Paul DeVivo, owner of the bench company, and his daughter Charissa Murray, who works with him on the business. Both great people who have contributed a lot to the island.

These types of advertising benches are specifically prohibited by Ordinance on private property, and we have denied permit requests for their placement outside businesses while allowing nearly identical advertising benches on the public rights of way nearby. We also have no agreement with Mr. DeVivo allowing this use of public property.

We told Mr. DeVivo over the summer that for these reasons, and because we were embarking on a larger wayfinding initiative designed to declutter the streetscape as well as new sign standards through our updated Land Development Code, that our intention was to phase the benches out over time.

In the ensuing months, I have spoken with a number of business owners and citizens who value the advertising exposure, and believe the benches add character to the island. I concluded that a compromise was likely in the community's best interest.

During our follow-up meeting with Paul and Charissa, we had a very productive discussion about all of these issues. We agreed on the following course of action:

1. All existing benches would be repositioned to face parallel to the roadway like a true street bench, instead of being angled toward oncoming traffic like a billboard. The only exceptions were benches placed at an angle at a corner, facing the middle of an intersection.
2. We agreed to work together to reduce the number of benches (there are currently 37) by half over a period of time. The focus will be placing the remaining benches in locations where, for the most part, people want to sit. Paul and Charissa will develop a proposed plan in January.

Once we come to terms, we will develop an agreement to add some clarity to the entire process, which has been informal through the years.

City of Tybee Bids Farewell to .org

Our IT partners at Infinity have completed the technical changes to transition all City emails and the City website URL to cityoftybee.gov, instead of cityoftybee.org.

We had been using both the .gov and .org domain extensions in a variety of contexts, which was inconsistent and confusing to some of our partners and customers. The switch will automatically reroute emails sent to a cityoftybee.org extension to the cityoftybee.gov extension, so the email will go to the correct City inbox no matter which extension the sender uses.

Business cards and other items printed with the .org extension will be replaced over time. Electronic signatures will change immediately across the City organization.

Tybee Island the #1 Winter Fishing Destination

Tybee Island has been declared the Number 1 spot for winter fishing in the United States!

The recent accolade came from Fishing Booker, which claims to be the world's largest platform for booking fishing charters: [Tybee Article Here](#)

The article notes that Tybee is "known for its relaxed charm, wide beaches, and scenic Atlantic coastline. A mix of beach-town appeal and salt marsh beauty makes it a favorite for both vacationers and anglers seeking a quieter winter retreat."

It mentions that the cooler temperatures bring significant inshore action, such as redfish, black drum, sheepshead and speckled trout.

This is a great accolade for Tybee as we work to grow our off-season visitation. Rep. Buddy Carter recognized the distinction from the House Floor this week:

Congress Underfunds Beach Nourishment in Proposed Appropriation

Some alarming news emerging on the beach nourishment front. Our federal lobbying firm, the Warwick Group, is sounding the alarm over the current budget shortfall for beach nourishment projects across the United States.

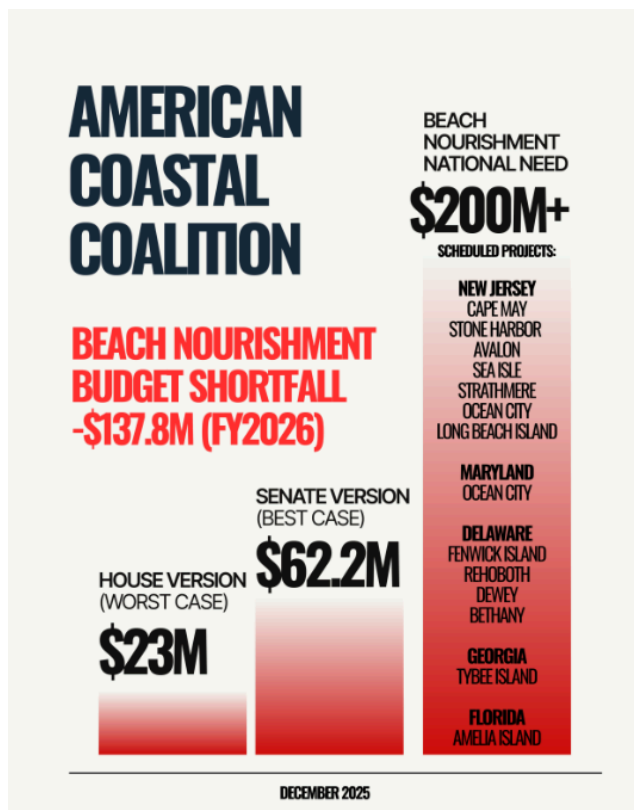
The Warwick Group reports that the House appropriations bill includes just \$23 million for beach nourishment projects nationwide, while the Senate version includes \$62.2 million. About \$200 million is needed to fully fund the nation's beach nourishment projects in a typical year.

Tybee is scheduled to receive our federal beach nourishment project in December 2026. The estimated cost of the project is \$20 million, with the federal government responsible for \$12 million of that total.

We meet regularly with US Army Corps of Engineers representatives, and they are on-track to execute the project on schedule. Without the funding in their budget, however, they cannot move forward.

It goes without saying that a delay in our nourishment project by even just one year would be catastrophic for Tybee given our current state of erosion. The Congressional Committee acknowledged the risks despite the lack of funding: "The Committee understands coastal flood risk is increasingly rapidly," the Committee wrote in its report. "Further, the Committee recognizes that beach renourishment is a critical tool to provide protection to life and property, yet such projects go unfunded in the budget request."

The Warwick Group runs a nonprofit called the American Coastal Coalition, which is comprised of more than a dozen beach communities on the East Coast, of which Tybee is a member. The American Coastal Coalition is planning a series of actions to raise awareness of the funding shortfall and its consequences. We are planning a news conference in January on our beach with state and federal partners. I will let you know of details as they are firmed up. We will need your advocacy help.

Tybee Fire is definitely in our slower season call-wise, so crews have been taking advantage and staying busy with yearly maintenance details. Crews have been completing hydrant checks, hose testing, and cleaning up around the station and grounds. A-shift did a deep clean on our training pods.

CPR Training Offered: The Department ordered some new CPR training mannequins this week. Our old ones have definitely seen their better days. Beach Manager Jen Bishop is conducting CPR classes this off-season, so if any departments or community organizations would like CPR training, please contact her through the Fire Department.

Expanding Use of AI: Chief McMillian attended an initial meeting with Infinity and City leadership about potentially utilizing CoPilot with Microsoft Office 365. CoPilot is a native AI that resides in the 365 environment, so it could possibly be a big future help for our employees. Integrating AI tools like CoPilot into the workforce offers significant benefits for effectiveness and efficiency. For instance, it can automate repetitive tasks

such as data entry, scheduling, and report generation, freeing up staff time for higher-value activities like strategic planning or community outreach. This leads to boosted productivity – studies show AI can enhance output by up to 40% in knowledge-based roles – while streamlining workflows and reducing errors through real-time data analysis and predictive insights.

For a small team like ours, this could mean faster response planning, more personalized training materials, and overall cost savings by optimizing resource allocation without needing extensive new hires.

Focus on Wildfire Mitigation: Chief McMillian is also taking initial steps to make Tybee a Firewise Community. A Firewise USA® recognized community is a proactive neighborhood, subdivision, or group that voluntarily implements and maintains a comprehensive wildfire mitigation plan, focusing on education, community involvement, and physical improvements like creating defensible space around homes and infrastructure. This designation, sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), requires annual assessments and "In Good Standing" status to demonstrate ongoing commitment to reducing wildfire risks.

The benefits are substantial: it lowers the potential for loss of life and property by building wildfire resilience through neighbor-led actions; strengthens community bonds via collaborative planning and events; unlocks access to grants, technical resources, and training from NFPA and partners; and can qualify residents for insurance discounts of up to 15–25% on premiums. For Tybee, with our coastal vulnerabilities to both wildfires and related hazards like erosion, this could enhance our overall emergency preparedness and position us as a model for other barrier island communities.

- Weekly wastewater and drinking water samples collected and tested.
- Cleaned the UV disinfection system.
- Met with department foreman on several issues.
- Maintained operations on the water and wastewater systems.

- **Animal Welfare Response – Pelican Court Marsh:**
Code Compliance received a call regarding a small dog trapped in the marsh near Pelican Court, an area outside City jurisdiction. 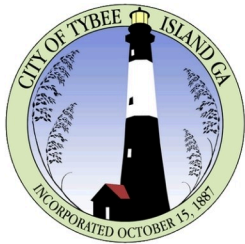

- Installed water spigots at all of our Primitive tent sites. Long term plan is to also add electric so that all of our tent sites are in the same category
