Greetings Mayor and Council,

Tybee Fire is making preparations for a prescribed burn that could be held the latter half of this week on the 7-acre accreted property between Captain's Row and Lighthouse Point.

City staff held a meeting Monday with neighbors of the property and the Georgia Forestry Commission to walk through details.

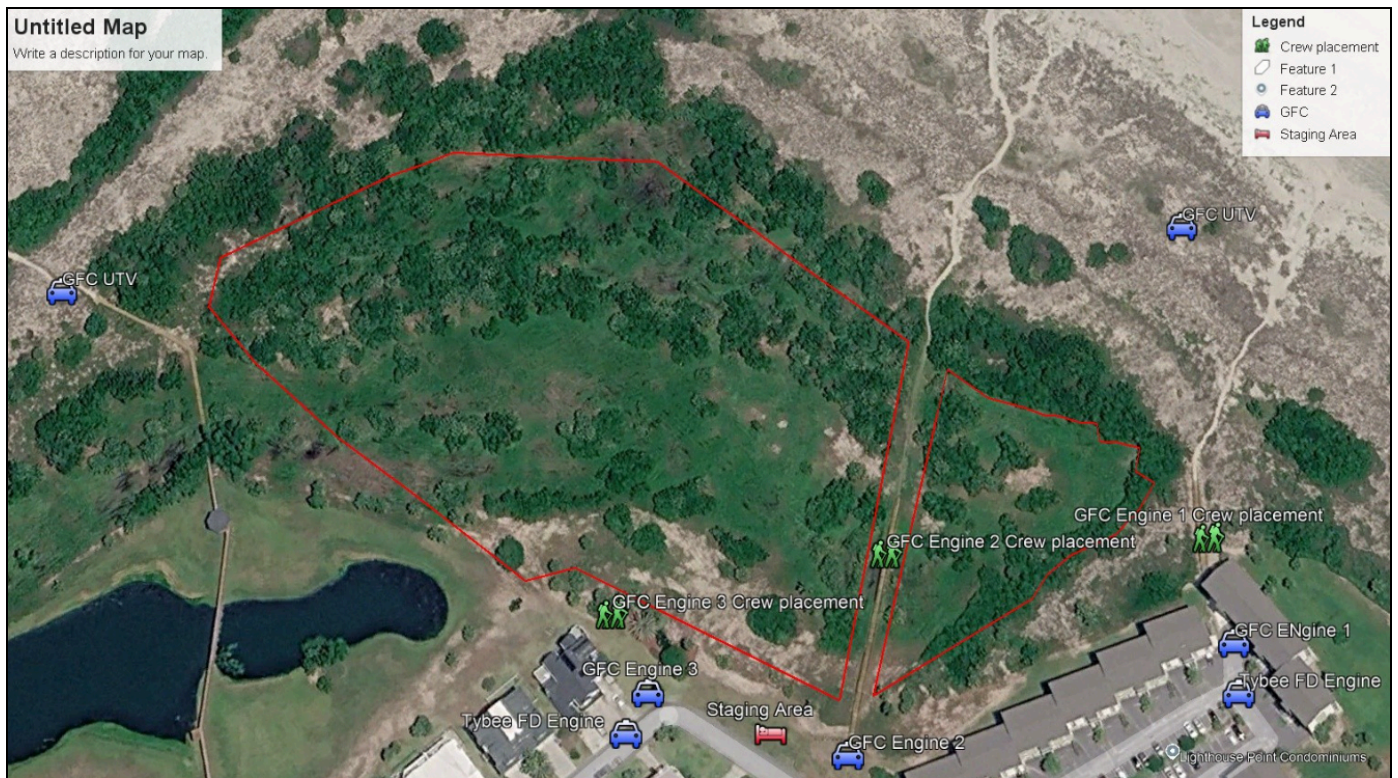
The below map shows the planned staging of apparatus and personnel, which will be positioned in strategic locations to protect the crossover, the neighboring properties, and the dune area.

Georgia Forestry will have far more personnel on hand than normally required for a burn of this size. They will be accompanied by a substantial crew from Tybee Fire. The entire operation is expected to take just a few hours.

Currently, the Forestry Commission is targeting this Friday for the burn, though that schedule is weather dependent. A fire will not be lit unless the wind is calm, and blowing away from structures. A fire break will be bulldozed around the perimeter of the burn and adjacent to the crossover on the property.

The goal of the operation is to control invasive species, of which more than a dozen have been identified on the property, and encourage the growth of native plants and grasses. We believe this property will be a showcase for land management in coastal communities.

We will send public communications about the burn out over the course of this week.



Crush Reloaded Update

Staff met on the beach a few weeks ago with Steven Smalls, the organizer of the event formerly called Orange Crush, now branded Crush Reloaded Beach Music Festival. The one-day event will be held from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, April 18.

We will hold two public meetings to discuss the event — at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. Thursday, April 2. We will brief Council during the next Workshop on April 1.

Mr. Smalls' event plan is nearly identical to last year's plan, contained to the beach between the Pier and Burke's Crossover. There will be a stage on the beach with entertainment. The DNR last week issued a letter of permission to Smalls to allow the structure to be set up the day before to avoid day-of scrambling. An early plan to hold a vendor's village on Hotel Tybee property has been abandoned.

The City's preparations are nearly identical to previous years. Barricades will be staged at key points across the island to limit traffic in residential areas. We plan to block off fewer on-street parking spaces along Butler Avenue than we have the past two years, but barricading will still be necessary to prevent pop-up parties and limit pedestrian crossing locations.

The 14th Street Parking Lot will be closed to provide space for event logistics, including stage load-in, staff parking and a tow yard. The South End parking lot will be open to parking decal holders only.

North Beach Dune Restoration Update

As you know, we have been working for months on a project to restore the North Beach dune system, which is severely eroded. The Georgia Department of Natural Resources had given us a window of between April 15 and May 31 to complete the project, which will add about 20,000 cubic yards of beach-quality sand to the dunes between roughly Polk Street and Teresa Lane.

We issued an invitation to bid on the project in February, and received three bids by the March 11 deadline. All three bids were in the range of \$2 million — roughly twice our budget, an estimate we believed was conservative based on similar projects.

Discussions with the bidders revealed the high prices are due to a shortage of beach-quality sand required by State and Federal regulators. All three bidders sourced the sand from a single supplier near Hinesville, which is about a 120-mile round-trip to Tybee. The contractors indicated that no other suppliers in the region could meet our specifications. This location is roughly three times the distance from our sand source during the last dune restoration in 2017. Costs were also inflated due to recent escalations and uncertainty with fuel prices.

We have spoken with representatives from the US Army Corps of Engineers, and there is an option to purchase additional sand from the Corps during the Tybee nourishment planned for late this fall. The Corps, as you know, will pump sand on our beach from a source about a mile off-shore. While the federal government will not include our beach north of North Beach in the federal project because it does not meet public access requirements, it can stockpile sand for us, which we would purchase at cost. That price would likely be less than a fifth of the cost of the inland source. We would then hire a contractor to haul the sand to the north end and shape the dunes according to our engineered designs.

We believe this option would result in a significant cost savings for Tybee. However, it would require us to wait until November/December to begin the project. Our consultants believe this delay will not threaten any structures along this stretch. And a delay could potentially allow us to nourish the dunes during the slower early winter months.

The big unknown, of course, is whether the federal project will happen this year. Our understanding is the US Army Corps FY26 Work Plan will be released March 30. We believe we will know then whether Tybee's project will be funded this year.

We have begun discussing a potentially delayed dune nourishment with North Beach property owners, and all have expressed support for the new timetable. In the meantime, we are working with the low bidder on ways to reduce costs for a project this spring. We plan to make the call next week, after we learn about the federal project.

Meanwhile, we continue to work with the Corps on a long-term solution that would send beneficial dredge material to the north end to replenish the dune system on a regular basis. The Corps regularly dredges the Savannah River Shipping Channel and sends that dredged material to an off-shore site. While parts of the Channel are muddy, other parts contain beach-quality sand.

There exists a potential win-win where the most erosion-prone section of our dune system is regularly nourished while saving the Corps money by providing them a closer spoil site.

The Corps is currently determining feasibility of the concept, which includes cost and material composition analysis. If those shake out, the Corp will complete the required documentation and compliance. If all goes well, the Corps expects the winter of 2027/28 or 2028/29 would be the most likely timing for launch of such a program.

Solomon Park Feedback

We held a public meeting March 19 to provide an overview of our Solomon Park plan, and to receive feedback. About 30 citizens attended.

Most attendees were supportive of the general park concept, while providing constructive feedback on the details. Assistant City Manager Michelle Owens did a fantastic job synthesizing the comments in the attached document.

We will use this input to develop a scope of work to bid out.

Meanwhile, City Council at the last meeting approved a contract to begin remediating impacted soils on the planned park site. That project is tentatively set to begin April 6.

Training and Development

Fire continues to stay busy building skills. Crews have completed EMS training hours and participated in meetings focused on drone operations and target solutions. We've also kicked off our fire training schedule and are working through pre-incident planning to better prepare for emergencies before they happen.

Additional coursework is under way through the Rescue One program, including Firefighter I and HazMat training. We're also looking into adding swift water rescue training to expand our capabilities even further.

Operations and Projects

Several important projects are moving forward as we prepare for the busy season ahead. We are continuing to work with the Georgia Forestry Commission on a planned prescribed burn on the north end of the island.

At the same time, crews are getting beach response units serviced and ready, making sure everything is in top shape for the months ahead. Fire Department personnel spent time this week improving the landscaping in front of the fire station. Crews are performing the work in-house with assistance from the Public Works Department, which provided necessary tools and landscaping timbers. These improvements will help create a more welcoming appearance for residents and visitors who stop by the station.



Ocean Rescue Division

Our Ocean Rescue program is ramping up as we get closer to the summer season. The team recently supported the Tybee Irish Heritage Parade, which was a great opportunity to connect with the community.

Lifeguard tryouts are being planned for April through June (pending final YMCA confirmation), and CPR/First Aid classes have been scheduled for YMCA staff. Lifeguard training courses are now open through the Red Cross Learning Center, helping us build a strong team for the season.

We are also exploring the option of certifying some of our fire personnel as Lifeguard Instructors. This would allow us to grow the program from within and provide more flexibility moving forward

Community Engagement – Lunch & Learn Presentation

Two weeks ago our new Special Operations Captain, **Tadd Rubin**, delivered a presentation at the All Saints Episcopal Church “Lunch & Learn” program. The presentation provided an opportunity for members of the community to meet Captain Rubin and learn more about the work of Tybee Island Fire & Rescue and several new initiatives underway within the department.

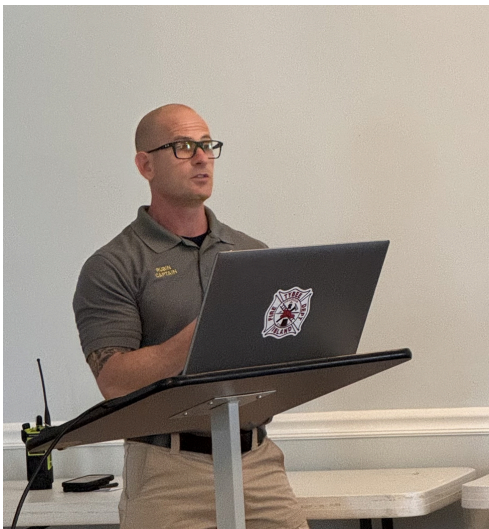
Following the event, Mr. Allen Lewis sent the following message to the City Manager:

Officers also assisted the Tybee Island Police Department with traffic control during the Irish Heritage Parade, helping maintain safe pedestrian and vehicle movement during the event.

Investigations and Notable Incidents:

Short-Term Rental Investigation – 28 Solomon Avenue

Code Compliance received a complaint regarding the continued use of a camper for short-term rental purposes. Investigation revealed the owner had discontinued the activity but had inadvertently left an online advertisement active. Once notified, the owner removed the advertisement and the matter was resolved.

Sandbar Safety Call – Chatham Crossover

Officers were dispatched regarding two individuals walking toward Little Tybee Island from the sandbar. Dispatch later advised that the individuals had returned to the beach prior to officer arrival.

Animal Welfare Incident – Strand Avenue

Code Compliance responded to Strand Avenue regarding a deceased canine. Officers met with the reporting party and later with the owners of the dog. The owners believed the dog had accidentally fallen from a second-story balcony. The owners retained custody of the animal for burial.

Animal Welfare Complaint – Back River Beach

Officers responded to a report of a dog on the beach. The animal was gone upon arrival.

Animal Welfare Complaint – Meddin Drive

Officers responded to a report of an unleashed dog running through the neighborhood. The dog was safely captured and returned to the owner, who was actively attempting to locate the animal.

Service Animal Encounter – 7th Street Beach

During routine patrol, officers observed a dog on the beach. The animal was confirmed to be a service animal and its description and location were relayed to dispatch.

Animal Confinement Citation – Irish Heritage Parade

Code Compliance assisted Tybee Island Police Department officers regarding a dog confined in a vehicle during the parade. The owner arrived on scene and was issued a citation. The dog did not appear to be in distress and was released to the owner.

Animal Welfare Follow-Up – Beachside Colony

Code Compliance received a complaint regarding a dog left on the back porch of a Condo at Beachside Colony. Attempts were made to contact the front desk and management company. Island Vacation Rentals later confirmed they no longer manage the unit but agreed to contact the property owner to address the issue.

Animal Welfare Complaint – Alley 3 Area

Officers responded to a complaint regarding a dog barking for several consecutive nights. Officers monitored the area but did not observe barking during the response.

Beach Fire Prevention – 9th Street

During beach patrol, officers observed a guest preparing a portable charcoal grill. The individual had not yet started a fire and was educated on the City ordinance prohibiting fires on the beach. The guest voluntarily removed the grill from the beach.

The Week with Communications and Outreach

Communications Manager Search

Main Street/DDA

HPC Update

The HPC currently has one vacancy on the Commission. Interested applicants are encouraged to contact Maggie Wright at maggie.wright@cityoftybee.gov for information. Maggie has posted flyers around town and shared the vacancy on social media to help recruit interested applicants.

Irish Heritage Parade

Staff prepared and decorated the Mobile Visitor Center vehicle for the parade, marking its first-ever appearance in the event. It was a fun and highly visible way to promote Tybee Island, the Main Street program, and Visit Tybee during one of the island's most popular celebrations. Parade-goers loved the vehicle, and it created a great opportunity to engage with both residents and visitors in a lively and memorable way.

Turtle Friendly Business Program

The Turtle Friendly Business Program continues to grow, with 19 businesses currently certified. Staff is coordinating the distribution of participation stipends and certificates to certified businesses and working on creating social media reels to highlight participating businesses and promote the program. This next phase will focus on increasing public awareness and encouraging additional businesses to participate through storytelling and visual content. Staff also created an advertisement for the Beachcomber magazine to promote the program.

Bike Decorating Contest

The Main Street Board and staff are planning a Bike Decorating Contest in celebration of National Bike Month in May, encouraging residents and businesses to get creative and showcase their decorated bicycles. Participants will submit photos through an online form, and winners will be selected in both resident and business categories. This initiative highlights Tybee Island's bike-friendly culture while creating a fun and engaging way to involve the community and promote local businesses. Planning is also underway for promotional graphics, community outreach, and business engagement to encourage participation island-wide.

Monthly Meeting

Main Street held its monthly Board Meeting on March 19, where members reviewed committee updates and discussed ongoing program initiatives. Updates were provided across the organization, highlighting current projects, upcoming events, and progress within each committee.

Meeting Broadcast Improvements

Staff has been working with our IT vendor and external vendors to troubleshoot and resolve ongoing issues with meeting broadcasting. Efforts have focused on identifying technical challenges, restoring live streaming connectivity, and ensuring a smoother experience for both in-person and remote viewers. Continued coordination is underway to implement solutions that enhance accessibility and consistency for future meetings.

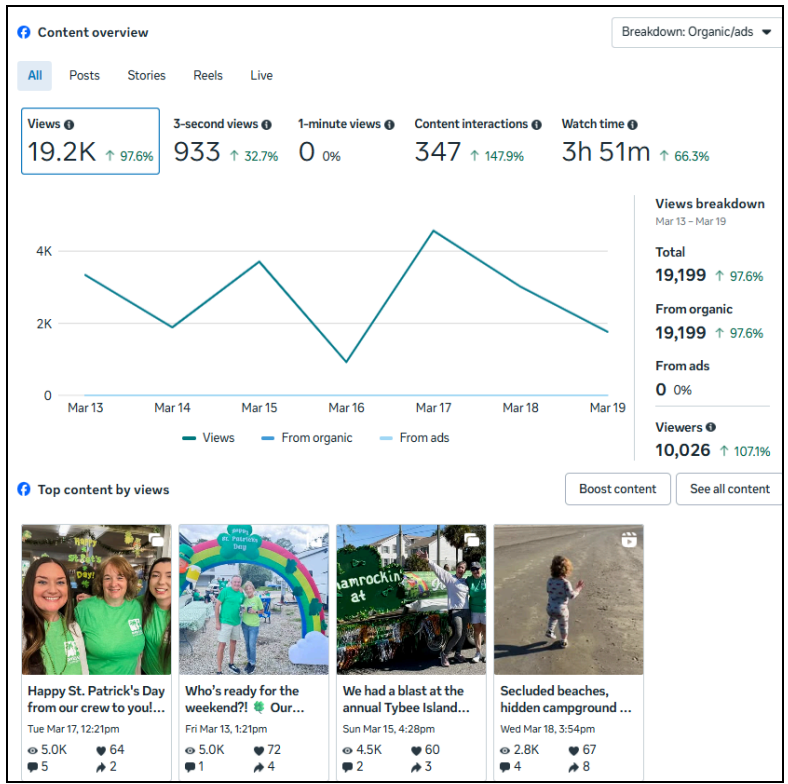

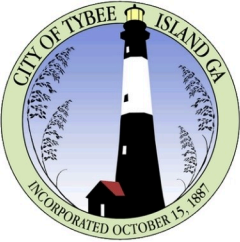
